After July 1, 1875

1 Mark = 100 Pfennig

Rate of exchange:

1 Gulden = 1.71 Mark

Philatelic history:

Oct. 15, 1851: First issue of the kingdom.

July 1, 1875: First official stamps.

Apr. 1, 1902: Regular stamps of Germany put into use. Official stamps of Wurtemberg remained in service through 1923.
